In focusing on the relation between infrastructures and practices I want to connect and also stretch already established ideas about materiality, about how social practices emerge and change, and about the demand for energy, mobility and other resources. In exploring these issues I will make use of empirical projects conducted within the DEMAND centre (www.demand.ac.uk), including research on the arrival of central heating; the provision of parking space and the relation between office space, digital technologies and office work. As well as providing new insights into the relation between supply and demand, this work demonstrates the relevance of practice theory for analysing seemingly 'big' questions about the dynamics of consumption and provision, and about policy responses to major challenges like those of climate change.
